Fumie Kato, PhD, is Associate Professor, Coordinator and Director of the Japanese Studies in the Department of Languages and Culture Studies, University of North Carolina at Charlotte. Her expertise lies in the applied linguistics, specifically foreign acquisition, learning strategies, student motivation and PBLL (Project-Based Language Learning). She earned a Ph.D. in applied linguistics at the University of Sydney in 2001 (after earned M.Ed. Honors in 1995).



Dr. Kato moved in Charlotte, United Sates, and commenced working as visiting Assistant Professor at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte in 2002. She developed around 10 courses and redesigned 7 courses for the Japanese program at UNC Charlotte. Recently the Japanese Program started to offer translation certificate, graduate translation certificate, business certificate and Japanese BA Honors.
